WANT YOUR KIDS TO BE SELF CONFIDENT? COURAGEOUS? RESPOND WELL TO CHALLENGE?

As a kid, did you ever play with fire? Jump from a high place? Put a coin on a railroad track? Superglue your fingers together? Throw things from a moving car?

Well, if you didn't, you should have. At least according to Gever Tulley and Julie Spiegler. They co-wrote a book called "50 Dangerous Things You Should Let Your Kids Do".

Now, the authors also say that these activities should be safe and parent-guided but we also know that we did many of these things without adults around. So will our kids.

Here's an important element: whether any of these things are really dangerous isn't as important as the idea that kids **think** it is dangerous. Jumping off the rafters in the barn into a pile of hay or from a bridge into water isn't really all that dangerous. The benefit to kids comes from just thinking it is dangerous.

That is what confers on them a sense of accomplishment, of having overcome a fear. Children who jump from high places arrive as adults without a fear of heights, psychologists tell us. And so it is with many if not all the other "dangerous" things in the book. Doing dangerous things seems to give them self-confidence, courage, and a willingness to take reasonable risk, attributes we seem to value. (pg.3)

Contrast this outcome with the alternative: children who mostly stay indoors, who are seldom confronted by challenging tasks, and who may grow up afraid.

So, shouldn't sailing be included on this list? It isn't, but maybe it should be since #48 in Tulley/Spiegler's book is "Explode a Bottle in the Freezer" - not too much of a challenge or all that dangerous.

Sailing, first of all, is safe. Let's be clear about that. But a kid on the water in a sailboat with a breeze thinks it is a little dangerous. And thinking it triggers the reward

- the sense of accomplishment, of having faced fear, of having to control the forces of wind, sail and water, of becoming the master of his or her environment.

Of course, capsizing will happen. But capsizing on a small boat isn't dangerous. Once the boat is righted and they sail off to dry out, they are rewarded again and with every subsequent challenge to their skill, courage, and endurance.

Oh, did I mention joy? Yes, they are rewarded with joy.

10 HP Limit To Disappear in June at Acton Lake

Beginning on Saturday,
June 7, watercraft powered by
more than 10 horsepower will
be allowed to operate at nowake speed on Acton Lake,
located at Hueston Woods
State Park in Preble and
Butler counties. This rule is
part of a new lake
management plan being
implemented as a pilot
program which will be tested
and evaluated during the 2014
and 2015 boating seasons.

On Thursday, June 5, representatives of the Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR) will host a public forum to answer questions about the new regulation. The forum will be held at 7 p.m. in the Delmingo Room of the Hueston Woods State Park Lodge.
