HSA's Sunfish Fleet dives back into the water this Sunday in earnest fashion as The Camptown Races Sunfish Regatta celebrates its sixth year. The regatta usually attracts a big crowd as boats arrive for junior and ladies camp, which starts on Monday.

Last year defending champion Laura Beebe had to go to the second tiebreaker to defeat Bill Molleran. Beebe, who is also the reigning 2017 Sunfish Series Queen, had to beat Molleran in the last race to claim the title. With each one winning two races, it came down to who beat who in the final race.

This year's Sunfish Series is currently being led by Bill Molleran who eeked out a narrow victory over a strong fleet in May at the first Sunfish event of the season, The Founders' Day Sunfish Regatta.

Plan to attend this Sunday. There are no regatta fees for this event and it is open to all Sunfish racers.

HSA hosted a regional sunfish championship last year that attracted 21 boats. This year, the OktoberFast Sunfish Regatta is again two days but not a regional championship. Two more Sunfish events after Sunday's racing will complete the Series with Augusto! in August, and OktoberFast in Oktober.

Also in August, Beebe and Yours Truly will attend the Sunfish North American Championships in Chicago, IL, where Pan American qualifying will once again bring some of the best Sunfish racers in the US and South America to compete.



Capri Championships Coming

Despite the absence of the defending champion, the Second Annual Capri Club Championship will take place Sunday, July 15.

Pete Peters, who won the inaugural event last year, will be out of town on a sailing trip to Torch Lake. A new champion is guaranteed.

The format for this race will be similar to last year's, depending on the number of participants. The boats, all Capri 14.2's, will come equipped with a junior crew who will stay with the boat throughout the afternoon.

Skippers will rotate from boat to boat, however, as each heat is run. The best finishers in each heat will move on to the championship round as others are eliminated.
